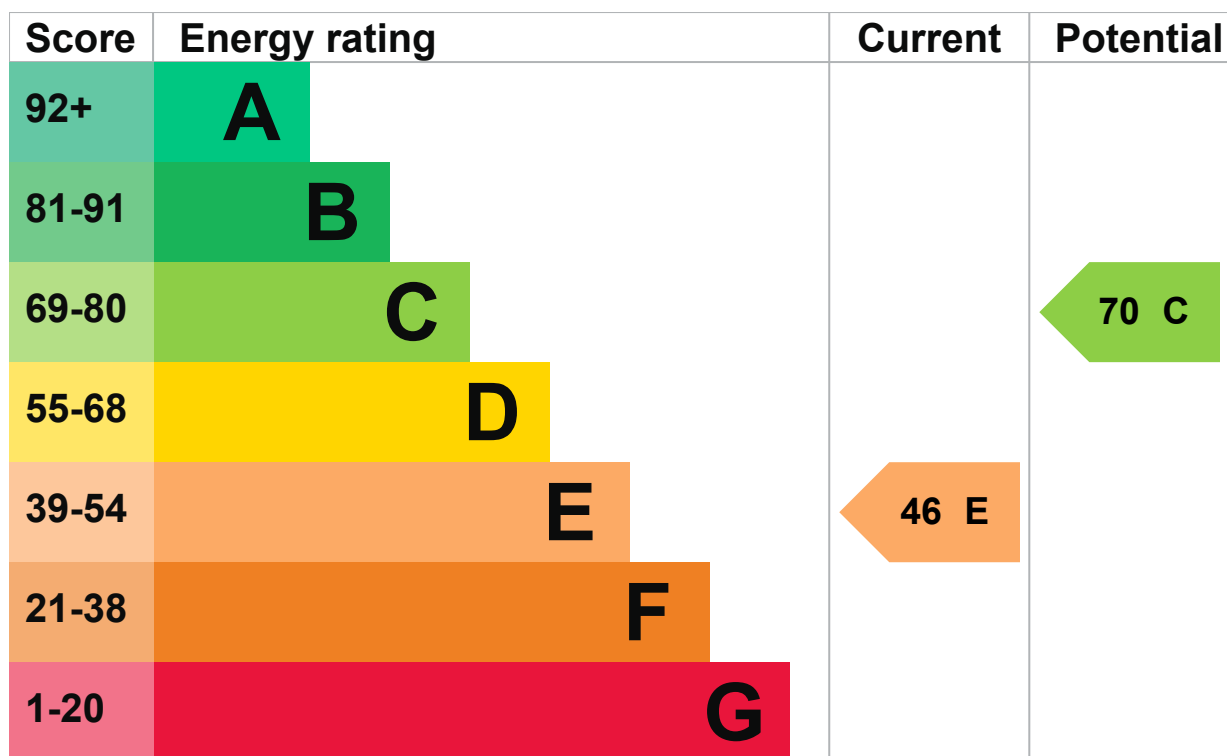

## How this affects your energy bills
